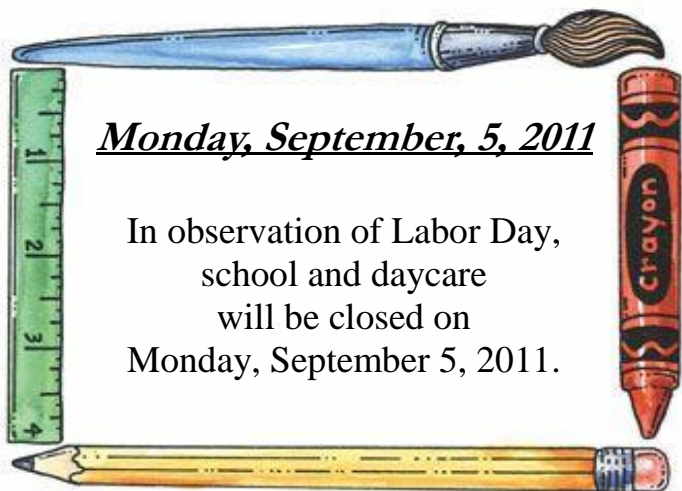

September 8 is the birthday of Mary, the Mother of Jesus.

Mary was a young Jewish girl who lived in Nazareth, a town in Galilee. So open was she to God's action in her life that God chose her to bring Christ to the waiting world. The Gospels are silent about her birth, but from the part she was to play in Christ's life, we know how special it was—even though the world did not know it at the time.

When the angel Gabriel was sent by God to Mary to announce the Savior's coming, Mary was engaged to Joseph. By the power of the Holy Spirit, she became the Mother of God. Because her elder relative Elizabeth was pregnant, Mary went to her town to help her. When Mary returned, she and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem for a census. While they were there, Mary gave birth to Jesus, the Savior.

Mary is in the Scripture two more significant times in Jesus' life. The Gospel of John included the story of Jesus' first public miracle. Jesus and Mary were at a wedding in Cana, and the wine ran out. At Mary's prompting, Jesus changed water into wine. Mary appeared again in Scripture standing at the foot of the cross as her son suffered and died. Jesus gave her to the apostle John as a mother, and she became our mother too. Mary was also with the apostles on Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came to the Church. She was the perfect disciple, the perfect Christian. We believe that at the end of her life Mary was taken to heaven body and soul. We celebrate this event on the feast of the Assumption, August 15.

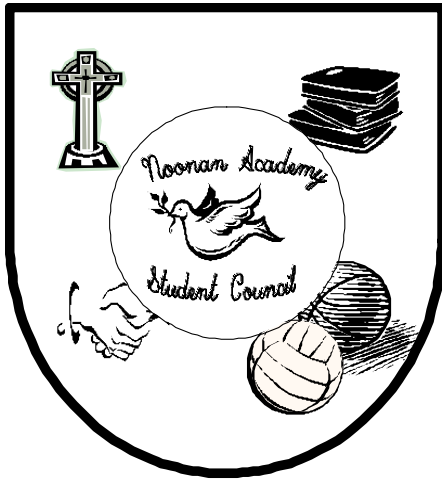
We honor Christ when we honor his mother. We celebrate Mary's birthday nine months after the feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8. The feast honors Mary for being without sin from the first moment of her existence.

Our Blessed Mother has many titles, but the greatest title of all is Mother of God. It is because Mary is the Mother of God that she has received her other privileges. On January 1, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Mother of God, a holy day in the United States. We honor Mary for giving us Jesus our Savior. We ask our mother to help us to be faithful children and followers of her son.

We honor Mary by imitating her virtues: her openness to God, her faithfulness, her humility, and her concern for others.

Tardy

One of the biggest concerns from our staff is the number of students who consistently arrive late and disrupt their class. The staff feels that tardiness is inconsiderate of them, and unfair to the children who arrive on time. Each time a child is tardy, the parent must come into the office and sign the child in. Please do not just drop your child off – you must come into the office and sign a tardy slip.

A tardy violation will result when a student arrives at school after the official start time of 8:00 a.m. The following consequences will apply to grades 5th through 8th.

Tardy - Progressive Disciplinary Action (5th – 8th Grade) Per Quarter

Students violating the *Tardy Guidelines* shall be disciplined as follows:

- 1st Offense = Parent/Guardian Contact
- 2nd Offense = Parent/Guardian Contact
- 3rd Offense = Parent/Guardian Contact
- 4th Offense = After School Detention
- 5th Offense = Saturday Detention
- 6th Offense = Saturday detention with loss of all after school activities for a week .
- 7th Offense = In school suspension with a complete removal of after school activities.

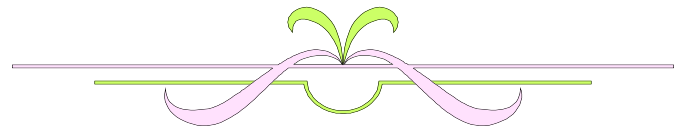


Mass at St. Anthony's Church

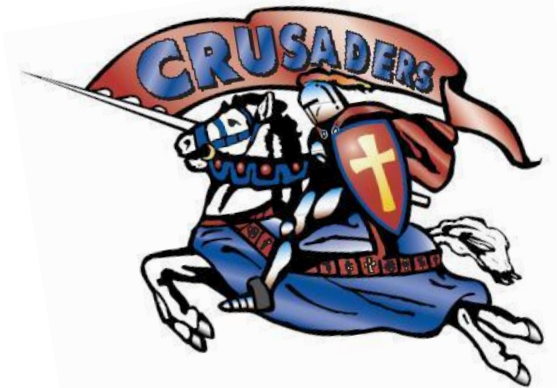

Parking in Front of a Mailboxes and Driveways

Dear Parent(s) or Guardian(s):

Several of our neighbors have complained about our parents parking in front of their driveways and mailboxes. If we block their driveway, their customers and employees cannot enter or exit and it disrupts their business flow.

In addition, if the mailbox is blocked, the United States Postal Service will not deliver mail. In order to deliver mail, there must be a fifteen feet clearance on either side of the mailbox.

Even if you are just running into the building for a minute or if you are in a pick-up line, please do not block a driveway or a mailbox. This is simple courtesy to our neighbors and our mail delivery person.

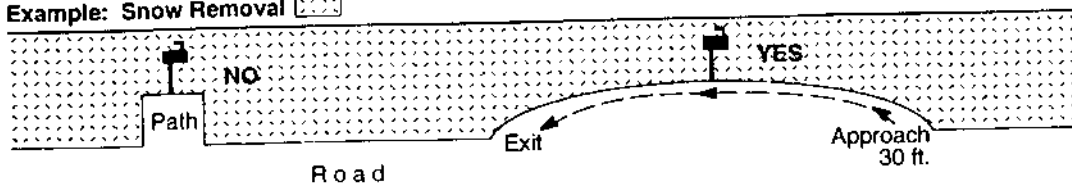


Approaches to Curbside Mailboxes

The Postal Service depends on you to meet postal requirements regarding delivery and collection of mail to curbside boxes. *Please keep the full approach and exits to your mailbox clear, as illustrated in the examples below.* Removing trash cans, snow, vehicles, and any other objects from the area allows the carrier to deliver your mail safely and efficiently without exiting the vehicle. Tips for Parents: Starting the New School Year Right

The beginning of a new school year can be the start of a journey toward success if parents, students, and teachers work together. Here are some suggestions from NEA for parents who want to help their child start the new school year right.

Getting to Know You

Make time to get to know your child's teacher and classroom aide. Let the teacher know that you appreciate feedback on your child's progress—both positive and negative. Alert the teacher to anything out of the ordinary that's going on with your child or family. Make a point of meeting other school staff members and others who work at the school. The better you know the school and how it operates, the more likely your child will be to have a productive and positive school experience.

A Place of One's Own

Whether it's a bedroom desk or the kitchen table, every child needs a regular place to study and complete homework. This area should be well lit and equipped with school supplies like paper, pencils and a dictionary. Siblings should respect the time set aside for studying and not distract the child who is doing homework.

Kids (and Parents) Love Routines

Set aside a specific time for studying every night. Discuss with your child what time of day would work best. Right after school? Just before dinner? Immediately following dinner? If your child attends an after-school program, find out if students will be expected to do homework there. If your child completes homework assignments away from home, plan to review the work at a set time every night. If homework has already been completed, have the child use study time for reading or reviewing problem areas.

Create High Expectations

To learn, children must believe that they can learn. As the parent, you are the most important adult in your child's life. The feedback you give your child—what you say and do about his or her abilities—will have a lasting impact on your child's self-confidence. Be encouraging and praise your child for the amount of effort that he puts into a project. Let her know that doing her best is what counts.

Reading Can Be Contagious

Research shows that children who are read to in their early years do better in school. Make reading a habit in your home, for both you and your child. Each night before bed, read to your child for at least 20 minutes. If the child is learning to read, ask him or her to read to you. For older children, set 30 minutes aside each night for family reading time when everyone reads together silently. Keep plenty of reading materials available—books, magazines and newspapers. Let your kids see you reading and they're more likely to pick up the habit.

Be Prepared for Your Next Parent–Teacher Conference

Talk with your child beforehand about what she thinks are her best subjects or what he likes least. Find out if your child has anything that he or she would like you to ask. Write down your own list of questions. Feel free to ask about your child's progress or about anything you don't understand about the school program. Expect the teacher to show you samples of your son's or daughter's work and to discuss how student progress is measured. Ask how your child interacts with other students. Most importantly, talk to the teacher about ways you can work together to help your child.

Schools + Communities = Success

To be effective, schools need the support of parents and the community. Find out key dates during the year when there will be opportunities for you to participate in school events. Mark your family calendar and your personal date book now to hold those dates.

Look for specific ways that you can support your child's school. Volunteer a few hours a week helping the school. Offer to speak to your child's class (or others) about a special hobby or area of expertise. Encourage a local business to adopt your child's school. Join the HFA to ensure that you have a voice in the work of the school. Offer to help with a special school project. Organize a school beautification day.

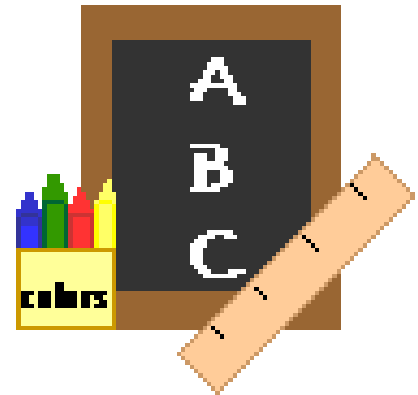

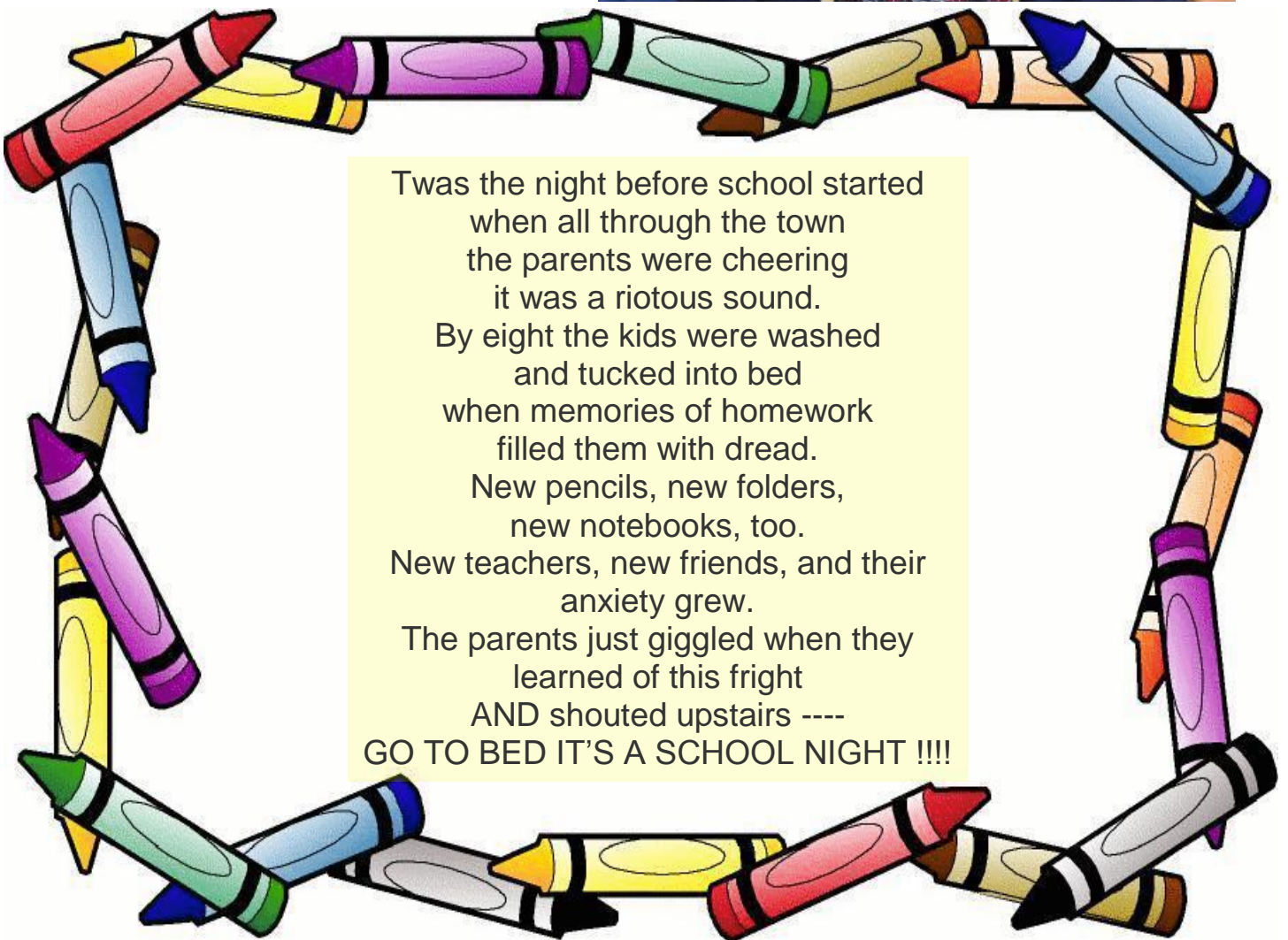

VIRTUS® PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN™ Program

All staff and all volunteers of Noonan Academy will be required to attend a Virtus training session prior to working with the students. After completing the training session a certificate will be issued that must be kept on file at the school.

- † Every staff member, regardless of position, will be required to attend the training session.
- † Every volunteer, regardless if you volunteer once or for the entire year, will be required to attend the training session. This includes all grades (Nursery – 8th grade.) Some examples include but are not limited to the following:

- † If you help with the concession stand – you must attend a training session
- † Room Moms – must attend a training session
- † If you help out in a classroom for parties/picnics – you must attend a training session.

- † If you help with Market Day – you must attend a training session.
- † If you help with Book Fairs – you must attend a training session.
- † All HFA Board Members – must attend a training session.
- † Drama Club chaperones/helpers – must attend a training session

- † Fundraising (if you help the student paint items for the dinner dance – must attend a training session
